2010 GONZALES COUNTY HAY SHOW

Hay producers who have baled hay in Gonzales County during the past year are invited to participate in the 2010 Gonzales County Hay Show.

Entries for the Hay Show need to be delivered to the Gonzales County Extension Office by Friday, October 1st, 2010.

The Show will be held on Thursday, October 21st, at the Saturn Sales & Service on Hwy 97, 5 ¹/₂ miles North of Gonzales. A stew supper will be held at 6:30 P.M. An educational program conducted by Rick Machen, Extension Livestock Specialist will provide two (2) continuing education units (CEU's) for private, non-commercial, and commercial pesticide license holders.

Producers participating in the Hay Show will obtain a free nutrient analysis on the hay they enter with one entry per class. There are six classes of hay for the show which producers can enter samples in, which include: Bermudagrass, Other Warm Season Perennial Grasses, Warm Season Annual Grasses, Cool Season Grasses, Legumes, Grass-Legume mixture.

The Hay Show is hosted by the Texas AgriLife Extension, Gonzales County Beef Cattle Committee, and the Gonzales Young Farmers. For more information, please contact the Gonzales County Extension Office at 830/672-8531.



Planning to Grow yourself out of the Drought?

If Fall rains continue, take a serious look at planting small grains or legumes on your pastures for grazing this Winter and early Spring. Start with a soil test to know your soil fertility status. Ryegrass, medic, and clover varieties can be overseeded with a broadcast seeder on bermudagrass pastures. Running a drag behind the seeder is optimal. Take a look at the results from the Luling Foundation Winter Forage Trails that have been conducted over the last 9 years. By Popular Demand— Texas A&M University's Dr. Wayne Hayenga and Estate Planning in Gonzales Friday, Oct. 15

The estate planning workshop got fabulous reviews at the Independent Cattlemen's Association of Texas (ICA) convention in June, and now, the show is on the road for the community! On Friday, Oct. 15, Dr. Wayne Hayenga, professor emeritus with Texas A&M University, attorney and nationally recognized speaker, will be in Gonzales to share his wit and wisdom about protecting assets for individuals, the family and heirs. In practical, easy-to-understand language, Dr. Hayenga will discuss the six vital documents—including living wills, power of attorney, ultimate medical directive, the nomination of a guardian, and wills and trusts--that every adult should consider for their legal arsenal to protect themselves in case of illness, incapacitation or death.

"Dr. Hayenga's presentation at the ICA convention was extremely popular and is especially timely now that 'death taxes' will be phased back in, beginning in January," said Bill Hyman, ICA executive director. "Everyone needs to be prepared for disaster—and that includes the personal eventualities of life. We are extremely fortunate that Dr. Hayenga could fit this meeting into his schedule, as he is in such demand, not only in Texas, but around the country."

"This workshop is open to the entire community and surrounding counties, as a joint public service of the ICA, Central Texas ICA All-Breed Bull and Female Sale, and the Gonzales Chamber of Commerce," said W. R. "Billy Bob" Low, cattle sale manager. "Registration is only \$10 and includes lunch, and the information to be presented is so valuable, it could save ranchers, business and home owners thousands and thousands of dollars. The afternoon session is the best investment anyone can make this year."

The workshop will be at the American Legion at 1612 Robertson Street in Gonzales and will begin at 10 a.m. with a free bonus pesticide training update for ranchers or business owners who need continuing education units conducted by Dwight Sexton, Texas AgriLife Extension, Gonzales County Agent. Lunch, included in the \$10 registration fee, will be served at 11:30 a.m., and Dr. Hayenga's estate planning session will run from 12:30 to 4:30 p.m. "Pre-registration is crucial, so plenty of materials, seating and food will be available," said Low. Ranch Management University

Purchasing land for the first time and entering the cattle business as a rookie can be a daunting endeavor, says a Texas AgriLife Extension Service expert.

"New land purchases are often made by individuals who don't have a firm understanding of the plant and animal ecosystem," says Dr. Larry Redmon, AgriLife Extension state forage specialist. "There's a tremendous learning curve when someone has acquired land and goes into the cattle business. There are a lot of questions on how to do things. There's a need for this type of information to be presented in a simple way, and we hope to do that through our Ranch Management University program."

The workshop, scheduled Oct. 12-15 in College Station and sponsored by AgriLife Extension, is designed to help new landowners have a better understanding of resource management.

Topic discussion begins with soils and soil fertility and proceeds to cover the basic aspects of ranch management, Redmon says.

"Those aspects include forage species selection, hay production, weed and brush management, beef cattle breed selection, nutrient requirements and feeding strategies for livestock. We'll also cover grazing management strategies and the popular chute-side talk and live-animal handling demonstrations of vaccinations, dehorning and castration."

Good record keeping, marketing plans and alternative enterprises will also be discussed.

"Many properties today are purchased for recreation and in Texas this means wildlife," Redmon says. "To address this need, wildlife management issues will also be covered."

Wildlife management topics will range from white-tailed deer management, dove and turkey hunting and management, ranch pond management, and feral hog issues.

Field demonstrations will include soil and hay sampling, assessing body condition scores for cattle, a look at forage variety trials, grazing management, a deer necropsy and hog trap construction.

About half of the program will be spent in a classroom setting, while the remainder of the time will be spent in the field. Lunch and supper will be provided Oct. 12-14, and lunch will be provided Oct. 15. Five and one-half private pesticide applicator license continuing education units will be offered.

A resource CD containing dozens of publications covering ranch management will be provided. Attendance is limited to the first 75 people. For additional information, contact Redmon at 979-845-2425.
